### Why GDP?

- Broad Measure of Economic Activity
- Nearly-universal *summary statistic* for the performance of an economy

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### As a summary statistic for the performance of Latinos in the U.S., the Latino GDP is impressive

- Total economic output of U.S. Latinos is very large \$2.6 Trillion in 2018
- U.S. Latino GDP is growing rapidly 74% faster than Non-Latino GDP (2010-18)
- Single biggest driver of Latino GDP growth is rising consumption 2010-2018: Latino real consumption grew 135% faster than Non-Latino

We conduct a detailed, bottom-up construction of Latino economic activity leveraging publicly available data from major U.S. agencies


Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) provides detailed input-output (I-O) tables

- Broad and deep measure of economic activity across 71 industrial sectors
- The most recent year for which this core building block is available is 2018

We combine the BEA I-O tables with data from the Census Bureau (BOC) & Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) to produce Latino I-O tables, which yield Latino-specific calculations of the major GDP components

• BOC and BLS provide breakouts of differences in income, spending, home ownership, educational attainment, labor market patterns and demographics


### U.S. Latino Gross Domestic Product (GDP)


### The single largest driver of rapid Latino GDP growth is personal Consumption growth

- From 2010-2018, Latino real consumption grew 135% faster than Non-Latino
- This dramatic increase is driven by large gains in personal income, which naturally flow from Latinos' rapid gains in educational attainment and strong labor force participation.

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# Growth of the Latino GDP is the result of rapid <u>human capital accumulation</u>




#### Educational attainment growth is 2.6x faster among Latinos than non-Latinos

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

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



# Latino Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by State






Across all 10 states, Latino population growth is 3.8 times that of Non-Latinos

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










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







# The Miami Metro Area's Latino economy is highly diversified. Five different sectors account for out-sized shares of the Miami Metro Latino GDP.

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
# Miami Metro Latino GDP - Population & Labor Force



#### Latinos are making strong and consistent contributions to the Miami Metro's population and labor force

- From 2010-18, Latino population growth was 6.8 times that of Non-Latinos (22.9 percent for Latinos compared to only 3.4 percent for Non-Latinos)
- From 2010-18, Latino labor force growth was 9.3 times that of Non-Latinos (22.6 percent compared to only 2.4 percent)


# Miami Metro Latino GDP - Population & Labor Force




#### The three most recent years, 2016-18, are particularly striking

- During that period, the Non-Latino population grew just 0.1 percent while the Latino population grew 5.5 percent (a rate 70 *times* that of Non-Latinos)
- During that period, the Latino labor force grew 5.8 percent even as the Non-Latino labor force contracted in each year




Miami Metro Labor Force: Participation Rate




# Educational attainment of Miami Metro Latinos is growing 2.4 *times* as fast as that of Non-Latinos

From 2010-2018, Latino's labor force participation rate was an average of 4.3 percentage points higher than Non-Latino. In 2018, it was 4.8 percentage points higher.


# Miami Metro Latino GDP - Households & Ownership



# From 2010-18, were it not for Latinos, the number of households in the Miami Metro Area would have declined

- During those years, number of Latino households increased 16.1 percent
- The number of Non-Latino households declined by 2.5 percent


# Miami Metro Latino GDP - Households & Ownership

- During those years, the number of Non-Latino home owners decreased by 2.8 percent


